Since his appointment to the Detroit Police Department in 1993, Police Officer Eugene Brown has been named in twenty-six (26) citizen complaints. Three (3) of the complaints involve his demeanor with citizens during telephone conversations or while interacting with citizens, all while assigned to work inside the station house in some capacity. (CCR #25078 – 6/5/95, CCR #24573 – 3/8/95 and CCR #27804 – 3/3/98)

In one complaint, he was among several officers named in an alleged harassment complaint. This Board gave no consideration to this specific complaint in this investigation (CCR #28219).

Of the remaining twenty-two (22) complaints, Officer Brown has worked with nineteen (19) different partners. Of significant importance, in twelve (12) of the complaints, in which Officer Brown had eleven (11) different partners, the complainants specifically indicated they had no complaints against his partners. The complainants

were specific in their allegations against Officer Brown. The findings of all CCR's are included as an attachment to this memorandum.

Among the allegations against Officer Brown by the various complainants are the following:

- Put handcuffs on too tight, told complainant to "shut the fuck up," called complainant a "motherfucker", put complainant in a choke hold and stated "I'll snap your fucking neck."
- 2. Rude and disrespectful to complainant during telephone conversation while working inside station.
- Disrespectful and improper demeanor toward citizen while working inside station ("Keep your damn comments to yourself, keep your sissy ass comments to yourself").
- 4. Officer Brown tightened the handcuffs after complainant indicated they were too tight. Wrenched complainant's handcuffed arms up in the air.
- 5. Punched complainant in ribs, told complainant "you're not tough you black motherfucker."
- 6. Officer Brown referred to complainant as "motherfucker" and a "son of a bitch."
- 7. Officer Brown is alleged to have called the complainant a "motherfucker", indicated he would "hang us niggers", and struck complainant several times while handcuffed, and forced complainant to lie face down while handcuffed, in the snow for an extended period.
- 8. Officer Brown told complainant to "get his fat ass out of the car." In this complaint, Officer Brown's partner is alleged to have referred to the complainant as "nigger, motherfucker, punk ass."
- Officer Brown grabbed complainant by the neck, banged his head twice into the car, kneed him in the groin and sprayed complainant in the face.
- 10. Officer Brown, while working inside the station, made inappropriate comments, and talked to the complainant in a demeaning manner while she (complainant) was attempting to make an accident report.
- 11. Officer Brown is alleged to have slammed the complainant into the scout car.
- 12. Officer Brown's partner is alleged to have held the complainant by the neck while Officer Brown hit him in the head twice.

The Executive Board of Review, during the course of this investigation, visited the scene of the three (3) fatal and one non-fatal shooting. Additionally, we reviewed all evidence, discovered new evidence, and discussed the fatal shootings during a personal setting with Dr. Kanluen of the Wayne County Medical Examiners Office. This executive Board of Review also worked closely with the Forensic Services Division of Executive Board of Review also worked closely with the Forensic Services Division of the Detroit Police Department, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms the Detroit Police Department, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Division, through the Forensic Services Division. Several other sections of the Detroit Police Department were of great assistance to the Executive Board of Review during this investigation.

The Executive Board of Review submits the following findings as it relates to the three (3) fatal shootings and one (1) non-fatal shooting involving Police Officer Eugene three (3) fatal shootings and one (1) non-fatal shooting involving Police Officer Eugene Brown, badge #714:



"Writer, P.O. Eugene Brown, badge #714 was working in uniform and in a marked scout car in the area of Grand River with P.O. Craig Stewart, badge #456 at approximately 2 AM. My partner was also in uniform at the

time. While on routine patrol I observed a gray station wagon driving in and out of the gas pumps at the Mobil station located on the comer of Grand River and W. Grand Blvd. I also observed that there was no license plate on the vehicle. My partner was driving our set-car and I was riding jump and we entered the gas station lot to investigate. I observed the driver of the vehicle. exit the car and go to a pay phone in the lot. The individual was a Black male approx 25 to 30 in a dark colored waist length jacket. My partner drove our vehicle up to the side of the station wagon with the front of our car facing the rear of the wagon. My partner confirmed that there was no plate on the rear of the car or up in the rear window. My partner also confirmed that there was no temporary sticker on the car. At this time the driver of the car called out and asked if there was a problem. He was still at the phone when he said this. My partner asked the man where his plate was and he indicated that he did not have a plate but that the temporary sticker was at home. The man left the phone and approached the rear of the gray car. The vehicle's engine was running and my partner asked if the man had keys for the car. He indicated that he did and that they were in the car. My partner requested that the man come over to the sct-car and instead of doing this the man continued to head for the rear of the station wagon. At this time I exited our scout car and walked around the front of our scout car towards the man. The man was now standing at the rear right of the station wagon. As I approached the man he placed his hands into his jacket pockets. At this time I ordered the man to remove his hands. Rather than do this the man dug deeper into his right pocket as if attempting to get something out of it. I believed that the man was reaching for some sort of a weapon and so I drew my dept. issued Glock, Model 22 #01309 DPD and again told the man to take his hands out of his pocket. The man backed up while still digging in his pocket and had moved to the passenger side of the car. I continued to walk towards him. At this time the man drew a knife out of his pocket and held it in his right hand. He held it in a stabbing manner. I ordered him to drop the weapon and he refused. He said "no, I'm not putting the knife down." He also said at this time "no, I'm not going." I was approx. 7-8 feet from the man at this time. I again ordered the man to drop the knife and at this time the man lunged at me with the knife. Fearing for my life I fired one shot from my above described weapon. The man was approx. 3-4 feet from me when I fired this shot. I do not know if it took effect. The man backed up and I again told him to drop the weapon. He was approx. 7-8 feet from me and at this time he raised the knife up above his head. The man charged at me with the knife over his head and the blade pointed at me. Fearing for my life I fired two more shots from my weapon. At this time the man fell to the ground. When I fired these shots I was approx. 4-5 feet from the man and he was coming at me. Dispatch was notified that shots had been fired and EMS and a 7-0 were needed. EMS arrived and Sgt. Pierce

In Officer Stewart's witness statement to the Homicide investigator, he makes reference to the fact that he couldn't tell which pocket Mr. Carrington pulled the knife from. Officer Stewart also indicated that Mr. Carrington had two (2) knives. He indicates that when Mr. Carrington was shot the first time, he dropped the one knife and pulled another one.

In Officer Brown's Preliminary Complaint Record, there is no mention of Mr. Carrington ever dropping the knife after the first shot and pulling a second knife from his pocket. As a matter of fact, there is no mention of a second knife being drawn in Officer Stewart's Preliminary Complaint Record.

One of the knives Bra-(the one lying next to Mr. Carrington's hand) was intact. The second knife was broken with the handle in one location and the blade in another Statemen

the knives were tested for prints and the results were negative.

One of the witnesses interviewed by Homicide, Ms. Sharon Ealy, indicated she will heard Mr. Carrington arguing with the officers, throwing his hands around, and pushing point during this incident did Officers Brown or Stewart claim to have been pushed by Mr. Carrington. MCL 15.243(1)(m)

Ms. Ealy indicated she could not distinguish which one of the officers fired the shots. Ms. Ealy indicated Mr. Carrington briefly turned his back to the officers after the first shot. However, she claims Mr. Carrington immediately turned back around and rushed the officers, then she heard four or five more shots. At this point Mr. Carrington ran into Grand River and fell in the street.

It also must be noted that Officers Brown and Stewart never mentioned that Mr. Carrington turned his back to them after the first or second shot was fired.

Three of the witnesses interviewed by Homicide, Mr. Kirby Michael Campbell, Mr. John Anthony Howard and Mr. Franklin Ramsey indicated they were in a van in the lot of the Amoco gas station across the street from the Mobil station. At this time Mr. Campbell and Mr. Howard heard two or three shots. Upon exiting the van they observed Mr. Carrington's body lying in the street with two officers standing over him. They did not see weapons in the officers hands nor could they say who fired the shots or how the incident occurred.

Two of the witnesses interviewed by Homicide, Mr. Robert Walker and Mr. James Hearns were interviewed by Lieutenant Rice of the Homicide Section. Both of these witnesses were inside of the Mobil gas station when this incident occurred. When

asked by Lieutenant Rice what they had seen or heard outside at the scene, they responded as follows:

Both Mr. Walker and Mr. Hearns heard a shot and looked outside and saw two police officers with their guns drawn pointed at a guy (Mr. Carrington) who was in a stance with his hands up like a boxer. They claim Mr. Carrington took a step towards the officers and then they heard two more shots. Mr. Carrington then fell to the ground on his knees, then got half way backup before falling on his back.

The Board of Review in their report indicates that on February 9, 1996, Lieutenant Rice of the Homicide Section interviewed a Mr. Robert Walker and Mr. James Hearns. When asked by Lieutenant Rice whether they had seen anyone else outside at the scene, they responded as follows:

"There was two people in a cab and they seen what happened. I didn't get the cab number, but it was black and yellow writing. There were three (3) guys across the street in the van."

Both Officer Brown and Officer Stewart stated that Mr. Carrington, wielding a knife in his right hand, lunged at Officer Brown in a stabbing motion. Officer Brown fired one (1) shot, which apparently did not take effect. Mr. Carrington is alleged to have backed up, then made a second attempt to assault Officer Brown by again lunging at him with the knife in a downward motion. Officer Brown then fired two (2) more shots at Mr. Carrington at which point Mr. Carrington fell to the ground. Both officer's statements specifically indicate that Mr. Carrington was facing Officer Brown, attempting to assault Officer Brown with a knife that he (Carrington) had in his right hand.

The Medical Examiners Report indicated that Mr. Carrington's body suffered two (2) through and through bullet wounds. They are briefly described as follows:


- 1. One bullet wound over the back of the left shoulder. The bullet entered the back of the left shoulder went into the chest passed through the left lung, ascending aorta, right lung and then exited through the skin over the lateral aspect of the right chest. The wound track is from left to right slightly downward.
- 2. One bullet wound to the left side of the lower abdomen. The wound track proceeds from this injury through the skin tissues and muscle of the

The Executive Board of Review met with the Medical Examiner, Dr. Sawait Kanluen on June 1, 2000. Dr. Kanluen indicated the following:

- (1.) The bullet wound behind the left shoulder was inflicted most likely when Mr. Carrington had his back slightly turned to the right and moving away from the shooter.
- (2.) The bullet wound to the lower left side of the stomach was inflicted when Mr. Carrington was turning to the right, away from the shooter.




On June 1, 2000, the Executive Board of Review met with Dr. Kanluen of the Wayne County Medical Examiners Office to review Mr. Grabble's Autopsy Report.

Dr. Kanluen stated the following to this Executive Board of Review:

Mr. Grabble suffered two (2) gunshot wounds to his lower back area. Both of these wounds were entry wounds, and there was no evidence of close range firing. One wound was through and through and non-fatal. The other wound entered the lower back and traveled at a slight upward trajectory. The bullet traveled through Mr. Grabble's lower left lung, and the lower left heart and the aorta. Dr. Kanluen indicates this was a fatal wound and Mr. Grabble had no more than a minute and a half of life left in his opinion. Dr. Kanluen stated the chest wounds on Mr. Grabble were close contact wounds indicating the barrel of Officer Brown's gun was less than a 1/4 inch from Mr. Grabble's chest. Dr. Kanluen further stated that from the appearance of the exit wounds on Mr. Grabble's back, it appears as though Mr. Grabble's back was up against something when he was shot.





The Board of Review reviewed the two Autopsy Reports. The first was prepared by Carl J. Schmidt, M.D., Assistant Medical Examiner, Wayne County Medical Examiner on January 22, 1999.

The Autopsy Report concluded that death was caused by two gunshot wounds to the head; one entrance wound to the right face, a superficial irregular wound on the right cheek, and one graze wound to the right face beneath the ear. Dr. Schmidt notes it is possible that the irregular wound could have been sustained from the impact of a jacket that was found entangled in the decedent's hair. He further notes that it is possible that the graze wound could have been sustained from the same bullet that entered the right face if the decedent's head was turning at the time of the injury. Dr. Schmidt also notes there is no evidence of close range fire on the skin. The following evidence was recovered and retained on evidence:

- (1.) Lead core fragment from a jacketed bullet removed from brain stem.
- (2.) Deformed jacket entangled in decedent's hair.

A second autopsy was performed on January 27, 1999 by Bernodino B. Pacris, M.D. Deputy Medical Examiner of Oakland County.

Dr. Pacris notes an entry wound to the right side of the cheek, a grazing wound to the right side of the face below the right ear, and a cutting wound on the right cheek measuring 1 1/2" in length. It is Dr. Pacris opinion that Mr. Miller died of a gunshot wound to the right upper cheek. Dr. Pacris notes that the two additional wounds on the lower part of the face most likely resulted from a bullet graze and a fragment impact. He concludes that the decedent had been shot at least twice and that there is no evidence of the close range fire.


The Executive Board of Review met with the Wayne County Medical Examiner, Dr. Sawait Kanluen on June 1, 2000. The Executive Board of Review was attempting to determine whether or not Mr. Miller had received one or two gunshot wounds to the face, and what could have caused what appeared to be additional wounds to Mr. Miller's face, as seen in the evidence photographs of Mr. Miller.

Dr. Kanluen, after reviewing the Medical Examiner's report regarding Mr. Miller, indicated that Mr. Miller received one gunshot wound. Dr. Kanluen indicated that the records indicated that lead fragments were removed from Mr. Miller's hair. Dr. Kanluen further indicated that it appeared the bullet had hit something and began to fragment prior to striking Mr. Miller. The abrasions on Mr. Miller's face were, in his opinion, caused by bullet fragments after the bullet struck some hard object. Dr. Kanluen further stated that the Medical Examiner's report showed that a lead core fragment from a jacketed bullet was removed from Mr. Miller's brain stem. Dr. Kanluen stated that when the bullet fragment entered Mr. Miller's brain stem, he (Mr. Miller) dropped "like a sack of potatoes". Dr. Kanluen was emphatic that death was instantaneous when the bullet entered Mr. Miller's brain stem.




On November 4, 1999 at 3:15 a.m. Mr. Willie Jerome Bryant B/M/26 of gave the following witness statement to Police Officer Michael Carlisle, badge 4339, of the Homicide Section at St. John Hospital:

- What happened tonight? "(Q.)
- I was north on Alter Rd. past E. Warren, I heard gunshots, about 2 or 3. When I crossed E. Warren, I heard some more. I turned right on Frankfort then right on (A.)Wayburn, drove straight till I ran through the fence. I spun out. I got out of the car police shined the light on me, I fell to the ground.
- Did you hear other shots? (Q.)

- (A.) Yes, when I crossed E. Warren again.
- (Q.) Who shot you?
- (A.) The police.
- (Q.) Whose car were you in?

 - (A.) I don't know.
 - (Q.) Describe your car?
 - (A.) · 84 Buick Regal, white two door."

In order to properly address these concerns a statement was secured from Mr. Bryant in June 2000 by the Executive Board of Review.

Mr. Bryant indicated that he did not realize that the police were trying to stop him when they initially pulled behind him. Mr. Bryant indicated that the vehicle behind him upon first encounter did not have its headlights or overhead lights and siren activated.

Mr. Bryant indicated that when he went through the fence south on Wayburn and jumped the curb he stopped the vehicle and opened the door and attempted to step out when he was shot in the left leg by the police officer for no reason. He then quickly reentered the vehicle attempting to pull off when he spun out of control in the mud while the police were firing shots at him. He indicated that at no time did he attempt to run any officer over with his vehicle.

A review of Mr. Bryant's Medical Records obtained from St. John Hospital revealed that he received a through and through gunshot wound to the left thigh. The bullet entered the left lateral thigh and exited the midline anterior thigh. According to Dr. Sizemore the attending physician the bullet entered the left outer thigh and exited the left inner thigh.

The Executive Board of Review located Mr. Bryant's vehicle, a white 2 dr. 1984 Buick Regal 1999 MI, QHM664 in the impoundment area of Nationwide Tow at 10350 Harper on July 12, 2000. At that time the vehicle was not being held as evidence nor had it been processed for same.

The Executive Board of Review immediately placed the vehicle on evidence and ordered it processed for same on July 14, 2000.

Police Officer Mary Gross, badge #624 of the Forensic Services Division processed the white Buick Regal, Mi Plate QHM664 which resulted in the following as stated in the Evidence Technician Report (E.T.R.):

There is old front end damage to the vehicle. The vehicle is unlocked.

The ignition switch is broken and there are no keys to the vehicle. The steering column has been damaged and there are pieces of plastic from the steering column on the left front floor.

The interior of the vehicle is red. There is a red cloth split bench seat in the front end, a bench seat in the rear. There is dried dirt on the front seat and front floor of the vehicle.

All the windows are rolled up and are intact, except for the right front window. The right front window is shattered. There are pieces of glass on the front seat, and both front and rear floors on the right.

Under the left front seat is an R-P 38 cal. SPL-P live round. There is a copper jacket fired bullet on the inside of the right rear deck lid.

I impact site is on the interior of the left front door. This projectile enters from the right side to the left, and doesn't penetrate through the door. The projectile impact site is measured 23" from the pavement and 29" from the back edge of the door. Behind the impact site is a concave strike mark in the metal of the door. A copper jacket fired bullet is recovered from inside the panel.

There are red stains of suspected blood on the left front seat, rocker panel and the interior of the left door.

There are approximately 4 projectile impact sites that entered into the vehicle.

I impact site is on the hood of the vehicle. The hood of this vehicle is 60" wide. This projectile enters from front to back on a right to left angle. This projectile penetrates through the hood of the vehicle. This projectile is measured 3" from the top edge of the hood and 23" from the right side of the hood. A lead and copper fragment is recovered from the lip of the vehicle under the hood where the windshield wipers are located.

I impact site enters the right side of the vehicle at the frame between the right front window and right rear opera window. This projectile enters straight in, from right to left on a downward angle. This projectile is measured 43" from the pavement and 70" from the rear of the vehicle. There is a projectile impact site on the top of the left rear seat cushion of the vehicle. This projectile penetrates through the seat and into interior of the left rear quarter panel. There is yellow stuffing material coming out of the far left hole. This projectile is measured 6" high from the rear seat. A copper jacket fired built is recovered behind the plastic panel.

1 impact site enters the trunk lid of the vehicle. The trunk of the vehicle is 60" wide. This projectile enters straight in, from the rear to front of the trunk lid. This projectile penetrates through the trunk. This projectile is measured 5" from the hinge edge of the trunk lid and 28' from the right side of the vehicle. A copper jacket fired bullet is recovered from the right side of the trunk lip of the trunk compartment.

I impact site enters the left rear quarter panel above the tire. This projectile enters straight in, from the rear to the front. This projectile is measured 27" from the pavement and 41" from the rear of the vehicle. This projectile penetrates through the left rear quarter panel and enters into the front of the wheel well and exits through the vehicle. There is a projectile impact on the inside of the left rear frame of the rear seat. This projectile impact is measured 14" high from the back seat.

The collection of this evidence was done by Officer Nix at the time of the shooting (on November 4, 1999 at 1:35a.m.) at the direction of the Special Assignment Squad of the Homicide Section as stated in the E.T.R.

The scene is on Wayburn street a public street between Waveney and Lozier within a residential neighborhood in the city of Detroit.

At the scene south of Waveney street on Wayburn street, 253' are two metal post used for chain link fencing. The chain link fence is now down on the ground as a result of the perpetrator driving through the construction area. The vehicle is currently at rest 423' south of fence on the grass 7' west of the west curb of Wayburn. The vehicle is a 1984 Buick, 2DR, White, PLT# QH664, VIN# 1G4AM47A0EH431117. The vehicle is at an angle, the front of the vehicle is pointing southwest and the rear is northeast. There is a bullet hole in the hood, in the trunk, and bullet hole to the drivers side rear quarter panel. The passenger side door window is broken and there is steering column damage. There are pieces of shattered glass in the street from the perpetrators vehicle. There are pieces of shattered glass 1' west of the sidewalk and 22' south of the front bumper of the vehicle. The vehicle direction of travel was southbound Wayburn. There is another chain link fence north of Lozier street to stop traffic on wayburn from entering and exiting. The perpetrators vehicle tire marks are varying off west of Wayburn into the open field. The tire marks are in a circular direction west and then northbound. The vehicle appear to have spent out of control creating striation marks on the sidewalk, as a result of the vehicle tires grabbing for traction. The vehicle is pointing southwest on the grass in the open field. Located 1' south of the striation marks are pieces of shattered glass (H).

There are several spent casing on the ground south of the vehicle. The perpetrators vehicle is 34' west of the east curb of Wayburn and 7' west of the west curb. The entire width of Wayburn is 27' east to west. Casing A is 29' southeast of the front bumper of the vehicle. Casing B is 28' southeast of the front bumper of the vehicle. Casing C is 28.5' southeast of the front bumper of the vehicle. Casing D is 28' southeast of the front bumper of the vehicle. Casing F is 31' southeast of the front bumper of the vehicle. Casing G is 34' southeast of the front bumper of the vehicle.

Sgt. Harvell requested photos of the scene and collection of evidence. Sgt.

Peterson requested the measurement of the distance surrounding the vehicle as well as the distance of the vehicle to the cross street west of the vehicle, where the complainant disregarded the fencing used to detour traffic from entering or exiting onto Lozier street which is east of the complainant's vehicle.

P.O. Eugene Fitzhugh exposed one roll of 12 exposures 35mm color prints films and one roll of 36 exposures 35 mm color prints film. P.O. Nix documented the scene with notes, collected evidence and made rough sketch of the scene.







"Members must always bear in mind that the use of firearms shall be confined to life threatening situations. The laws of this state and rules of the department demand that members use only the minimum degree of force necessary to effect an arrest. Members must also consider that the minimum sentence imposed by our court system would result in neither death nor injury. A member shall not discharge a firearm in an attempt to apprehend a person on mere suspicion that a crime, no matter how serious, was committed or on mere suspicion that the person being pursued committed the crime. A member shall either have witnessed the crime or have probable cause to believe that the person committed an offense for which the use of deadly force is permissible in accordance with departmental directives. Probable cause means a reasonable belief based on the facts and circumstances known to the officer at the point in time to cause the officer to believe that the crime occurred and that the suspect committed it"

"Members shall not fire upon a person who is fleeing on suspicion alone that such person may have committed a life threatening felony or solely because a person fails to stop upon command or runs a blockade".






