# Eastern is latest college to fold its yearbook

"The book had not adapted to a changing constituency. The Aurora had not been a strong tradition. They had only sold about 300 copies for several years."

But Jason Salhaney, editor of the Aurora last year, said the university didn't do enough to market the book. He tried unsuccessfully last month to dissuade the EMU Student Media Board from giving it the ax.

"It's a piece of EMU history that is gone forever," said Salhaney, a senior from Livonia

Jan Childress, president-elect of College Media Advisers, a 700-member, Memphis-based professional organization of faculty media advisers, said what happened to the Aurora is happening around the country.

Yearbook sales are hit particularly hard on large campuses where there are many older and commuter students, Childress said. But sales are dropping even on campuses with large residential populations.

"Today's students are very visual and more computer-oriented," said Childress, director of student publications at Texas Technical University in Lubbock. "They think differently than they did 15 or 20 years ago.

"And if you're married and have a job and go to school at night, you don't think about a yearbook," she said. "We'll never get back to the numbers we saw in the 1960s when there were huge book sales."

Childress said some colleges are considering putting their yearbooks on CD-ROM. Video supplements that include highlights of campus events and sports events tend to be more popular among high school students than college students, she said.

At Michigan State University, the 108-year-old Red Cedar Log suspended publication this year after selling

fewer than 300 copies last year on the 40,000-student campus, said Sha-Ron Hampton, chairperson of the MSU Student Assembly, which oversees the vearbook.

Even with the addition of President Bill Clinton's 1995 graduation address, sales did not increase for the 254-page, \$55 book, Hampton said. The student assembly is setting up a committee to redesign the yearbook to appeal to more students and it is scheduled to resume publication next year.

"The biggest problem is that it's hard to associate with a yearbook at such a large university," Hampton said. "It's hard to buy a book when you may not know anyone in it.

At the University of Michigan, the staff of the Michiganensian yearbook is trying new marketing strategies for the centennial edition due out in the spring, said editor Tara Roehm. Last year, the Michiganensian sold

2,341 copies on the 36,000-student campus and ended the year with a \$42,000 deficit.

This year, the yearbook is being promoted more widely in classrooms, residence halls, the student union and other gathering places. Information has also been mailed to students' home and campus addresses

And for the first time, more than 3,100 freshmen and sophomores were photographed for group pictures in their residence halls in an effort to interest them in the book, Roehm said.

Early sales indicate the increased romotions are helping, Roehm said. By the end of September, 1,600 books had been purchased, compared with

fewer than 300 at this time last year. At tiny Hillsdale College, the 100year-old yearbook, known since 1913 as the Winona, is subsidized by student fees and distributed for free, said John Coonradt, faculty adviser. Last year, about 1,200 copies were distributed to faculty and 1,150 students.

# Youth prison to be privately run

LANSING - Michigan's first prison designed strictly for violent juveniles would also be the state's first privately run correctional facility, under plans being developed by Gov. John Engler and Republican lawmakers.

Those plans call for a contract with a company to build, maintain and run the 400-bed facility.

"Privately run prisons have been very successful elsewhere, and this seemed like a perfect chance to try it out in Michigan," Jeff McAlvey, Engler's legislative director, said Mon-

day. The governor and legislators be-mivatizing lieve they'd save money by privatizing a new prison but there were no estimates on how much.

The bank is among several that the Detroit Alliance for Fair Banking, a coalition of community groups seeking to help Detroiters take out loans, had asked for help.

The Rev. Wendell Anthony, president of the Detroit chapter of the NAACP, said the coalition started negotiating with the bank in May. He said banks should see that there is a market for borrowers in Detroit and make money available to them.

Many small businesses operating out of homes don't know where to go to get money, Anthony.said.

"We want to make sure it gets to people who are trying to enhance their communities," he said.

Professor Robert Marans, chairman of the Urban and Regional Planning Department at the University of Michigan, said the bank's commitment is significant.

"This alone isn't going to turn the city around," Marans said, "but this, with new development, these are the things that are going to begin to turn the city around."
