Release Signed Statement To Civil Rights Commission

DETROIT — Rev. James Wadsworth, President, Det-
 roit Branch, National Association for the Advancement of
 Colored People today forwarded to Mayor Jerome Cava-
 naugh, Police Commissioner Ray Girardin and the Michigan
 Civil Rights Commission copies of a sworn statement made
 by an eye-witness to the police beating of Barbara Jackson.

The eye witness to the event is himself a public official with an excellent record of public service. At the same time that the statement was released, Rev. Wadsworth reported on news at- tempts by members of the Police Department to intimidate witnesses involved in the case. Rev. Wadsworth, in comment- ing on the eye-witness statement said:

"We recently met with Com- missioner Girardin about the Barbara Jackson beating. At that time he reported to us that the Police Department had completed its investigation of itself and found that it was not guilty. According to their official in- vestigation Barbara Jackson sus- tained her injuries as the result of a self-inflicted fall in the police garage.

The Branch President noted that the witness had corroborated Barbara Jackson in every way. The witness saw that her hands were cuffed behind her back and the police officer pick-

ed her up "just like a baby" and "he just slammed her down."
 "More frightening than the particular incident of brutality is the depth of corruption within the Police Department that this case has revealed," said Rev. Wadsworth.

"Since this complaint was first made to the Detroit Police Department, despite promises of protection, Barbara Jackson was subsequently arrested and held for four hours by police officers whose sole mission was to try and get her to deny her complaint that she was beaten by police officers."

"A number of questions have arisen as a result of this case that require forthright answers," Rev. Wadsworth said.

"Why was Barbara Jackson held for four hours incommunicado and questioned by relays of police officers attempting to get her to change her story and then an official report issued stating that her injuries were the result of a fall?"

"How is it possible that the police investigation of these events failed to produce any disinter- ested eye witness while the NAACP, without the resources of the police department, was able to pro- duce such a witness?"

The NAACP Branch President said that "Every Citizen who is concerned with law and order is entitled to a full answer to each of these questions."
 "Mayor Cavanaugh," the NAACP leader said, "promised us in a recent interview that he would not countenance a whitewash of police brutality. He appeared sincere in that statement. The matter is now in his hands and the hands of his police Commissioner and the Michigan Civil Rights Commission."

"The NAACP invites all citizens, Negro or White, with complaints of police brutality to come to the NAACP for aid and assistance." Rev. Wadsworth said. "The problem of proper law enforcement is not the particular concern of any one section of our community but the problem for all citizens concerned with truth and justice."

WQRS Nears Final Crisis

DETROIT — The staff and subscribers of Detroit's unique radio station WQRS-FM are rallying to meet what appears to be a final crisis in its two years' struggle for survival as a listener-supported station.

Out-of-state, commercial broadcasting interests have apparently bought WQRS and intend to re- vamp the station to a background music format.

As a "listener-supported" and "commercial free" station — the only one in the Midwest — WQRS operates on the premise that adult listeners adverse to radio commercials will support a non-commercial station by donations and yearly subscriptions.

In August when the owner announced his intention to sell WQRS, interested supporters united with the staff and formed a non-profit Broadcasting Foundation to attempt purchase of the station at the reported price — \$60,000.

Foundation, led by program director Angela McBride and staff member William Cough (at- torney), mustered enough financial and moral support to make a counter offer with a \$100,000 deposit on August 31.

The owner, however, stated that the sale to out-of-state, commercial interest was completed several hours earlier the same day.

The Foundation's recourse at present is to contest the other party's application for a broad- casting license with the Federal Communications Commission.

The Foundation is also seeking letters of support from listeners and organizations. "If everyone who sincerely appreciates WQRS would express their feelings in writing," said Hilly, "this alone could make our case before the FCC."

St. Augustine Segregationists Blocked By U.S. District Judge

JACKSONVILLE — Seventeen restaurants and motels were ordered to accept Negro patrons in an order signed by U.S. District Judge Bryan V. Simpson here this week.

Judge Simpson also enjoined Holstead "Boss" Manucy, staunch segregationist and the Ancient City Gun Club, from interfering with the business establishments or Negroes seeking service.

Most of the restaurants involved in the court action had voluntarily complied with the Public Accommodations section of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. Relief was sought by court action when pressure and threats from segregationists in St. Augustine,

however, forced them to re-segregate their facilities. The judge clearly implied that fees would be granted in future cases of this sort. Earlier in the summer, Judge Simpson awarded fees to lawyers when holding a restaurant which was bound by the injunction and a deputed citizen in contempt for failing to comply with the court order.

In addition Judge Simpson entered an order requiring the Ancient City Gun Club-the staunch foes of integration in St. Augustine — to divulge the names and addresses of all of its members within 15 days.

Following the permanent injunctions, two more motels voluntarily agreed to desegregate and the other establishments will most likely follow suit.

U.S. Court Upholds Ruling Against Urban Renewal Bais

CINCINNATI — The U.S. Court of Appeals this week ruled that a Nashville motel must accept Negroes.

The case has direct implications for all Urban Renewal programs, built before 1962, which excluded Negroes.

The Holiday Inn Motel, which refused Negroes in Nashville, Tenn., was built on land cleared, in part, two thirds with federal funds, as part of Nashville's urban renewal program. Acting under Tennessee laws, the Nashville Housing Authority "condemned or purchased the 72 acres of land needed for the project" in the Capital Hill Redevelopment Project.

They then "relocated 301 families and 196 individuals," the Court of Appeals pointed out.

"Of the families moved out, 288 were Negroes as were 190 of the individuals moved. Subse- quently Holiday Inns of Ameri- ca, Inc. purchased its property. The Court further pointed out

that the Motel was conceived by the Capital Hill Redevelopment Project, "its creation was made possible by the execution of the project, and its existence is now governed to a great degree by the project's predetermined design and controls."

The suit was filed by Dr. Yaco A. Smith, Jr., a Negro from Memphis who was refused a room on December 4, 1962.

"This decision also makes specific judicial relief available in instances of discrimination by urban renewal projects built since 1962."

"It will affect rental housing, homes for sale, commercial property, and every other facility which has been built with urban renewal aid," the Legal Defense Fund's chief counsel said.

Wilkins Lauds Detroit Leader

DETROIT—Executive Di- rector Roy Wilkins of the National Association for the Ad- vancement of Colored People lauded the role played by Dr. James J. McClellon in the civil rights fight in De- troit and elsewhere in the North.

Speaking to 400 guests at- tending the 26th anniversary and appreciation dinner of eight years and NAACP Board member of 19 years, Mr. Wilkins said Dr. McClel- lon's efforts in the Fight for Freedom had made possible the significant gains now enjoyed by Negro Americans not only in the Motor City but elsewhere in the United States.

In an unannounced ceremony, Father Malcolm G. Dade, St. Cyprian's rector, presented Mr. Wilkins with an ap- preciation medal from the Bishop of the diocese, Rt. Rev. Richard S. Emsich.
