A CITIZEN CODE FOR FIGHTING CRIME

LAW ENFORCEMENT IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

TEN WAYS A CITIZEN CAN HELP

1. If you see a fight, an accident, a crime, Call WO 2-5700 and state the facts to the police officer who answers.
2. If you see circumstances which make you believe a holdup, a burglary, or other violent crime is being committed, call WO 2-5700 and state what you have seen and the location to the police officer who answers.
3. If you know where organized crime is operating in gambling, in sale of narcotics, or in vice, call or write the Inspector of your precinct or the Commissioner or Superintendent of Police, 1300 Beaubien Street, Detroit 26, Michigan.
4. Help us help you protect your property. Lock your car. Lock your door.
5. If you receive a ticket for an inadvertent violation of a traffic ordinance, accept it as a reminder which could save a life. The Police Department emphasizes police courtesy. Citizen courtesy helps, too.
6. Sound law enforcement depends on citizen support. Be willing to give your name as a witness. Be prepared to testify in court.
7. Rely on the police department for protection. Never carry weapons. Teach children not to carry knives. Keep guns away from children.
8. Teach your children to respect our law and to regard the police officer as a guardian and a friend.
9. Set an example for your children of living by the moral code of your religious faith. Give them convictions strong enough to resist a temptation or a dare to do what they know is wrong.
10. In these and other ways be proud "to get involved" in supporting law enforcement.
