To provide 350 individuals and families with bilingual referrals to receive emergency food

To assist 250 individuals and families with bilingual information and advocacy to resolve payment problems and atop shut-off situations with utility companies

To coordinate a bilingual tax preparation program with the Accounting Aid Society to side 400 low income Latino and Southwest Detroit residents to file their income tax, home heating credit forms and property tax forms

To provide bilingual employment information and referral for 200 individuals to aid them in securing employment

To provide 200 Latinos and Southwest Detroit residents with access and assistance to bilingual legal services

To provide 225 Latinos and Southwest Detroit residents with bilingual information/referral and advocacy to aid them in communicating and receiving services from medical practitioners and medical facilities and/or to assist them in resolving medical bill payment problems

To coordinate the LA SED Yuletide fundraiser to secure donations to implement the LA SED Yuletide Toy Distribution program which provide 450 low-income children and families with Christmas gifts

To provide advocacy to increase Latino employment recruitment and retention with six governmental and private institutions serving the general public; i.e. Detroit Police Department

To provide advocacy to increase Latino recruitment and retention of students and personnel with public and private educational institutions at all levels of academia; i.e. Detroit Public Schools, University of Michigan and to advocate for multicultural curriculums in schools enrolling Latino students

To provide advocacy in formulating/operating 10 coalitions to address Latino and Southwest Detroit issues of concern at local and state-wide levels; i.e. Michigan Hispanic Senior Citizens Coalition

To provide advocacy and/or information and referral or technical assistance for approximately 800 individuals, groups, and organizations by the end of the fiscal year

LA SED Youth Program Goals and Objectives 1993-1994

What are the intended outcomes of the service or program?

For Latino adolescents to successfully attend and perform in school at the middle, high school and collegiate levels.

For Latino youth to be knowledgeable of college admission requirements, financial aid programs and scholarship opportunities in order to formulate and pursue positive career goals.

For Latino youth to be aware of the legal, social, cultural and employment consequences of involvement in gang and criminal activities and to choose alternative positive social and recreational activities available for them.

For Latino adolescents to graduate from high school and enroll in a college/trade school program.

For Latino youth to participate in enriching supervised recreational activities in which respect cooperation, teamwork and leadership skills are developed.

For Latino youth to successfully complete the LA SED Youth Program employment training program and develop appropriate employment attitude, dress and conduct skills and be knowledgeable of career opportunities available for them and the requirements to secure these positions.

To increase Latino youths' knowledge of future positive opportunities available for them which will decrease unwanted pregnancies.

What measurable objectives will be used to evaluate service or program results?

To educate 250 Latino adolescents and young adults in college admission requirements, financial aid programs, and scholarship opportunities and to aid them in formulating and pursuing positive career goals.

To have 65% of clients enrolled in school, at the middle school, college level successfully complete their academic year.

To inform 100 Latino adolescents and young adults on the legal, social, cultural, and employment consequences of involvement in gang and criminal activities and to explore and encourage alternative positive social and recreational

activities available for them.

To have 70% of Latino adolescents, who will graduate in June 1994 and who are participating at LA SED Youth Program, to enroll in a college/trade school program. To have 95% of participants in the LA SED Youth Program recreation program not be involved in criminal or violent activity while participating in the recreational activity.

To improve familial communications and relationships in 80% of cases involving familial conflict.

To reduce violent expressions of anger in 60% of clients regularly participating in the program.

To train 80 youth in appropriate employment attitude, dress and conduct and educate them on career opportunities and requirements.

To compile 75 resumes and refer 200 youth and young adults for employment.

For 85% of youth participants to not have an unwanted pregnancy.
